Safety Committee

The Butchers Hill Safety Committee will be busy in February planning how to execute the generous \$50K grant we received from the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development. The committee met in late January with a number of East Baltimore neighborhood safety committees who had also received these grants to explore economies of scale and where we could work together as neighborhoods on concepts for a safer East Baltimore. We are hopeful that our proposed traffic calming, pedestrian/driver safety, and video technologies will provide a big safety benefit to Butchers Hill. If working on these issues interests you, please come to our February Safety Committee meeting and help us plan for a safer community—all are welcome.

On Feb. 15 at 6pm, we will conduct our next monthly community safety walk. We'll meet at Castle Street Park and explore safety issues in the northwest corner of Butchers Hill. These walks typically explore matters such as poor street lighting, abandoned property, and pedestrian/driving hazards. All are welcome to attend this event. Come out, meet your neighbors, walk your dog/cat, exchange safety tradecraft, and experience the wonderful diversity of our beautiful community.

Transportation Committee

With the help of Ethan Hasiuk from Zeke Cohen's office and in partnership with Upper Fells Point Improvement Association and Fells Prospect, we recently held a very successful meeting with DOT and have submitted a multi-year request for traffic calming in the combined area of the three neighborhoods. The request is tiered, and the first tier includes four-way stops at Pratt and Lombard and Collington. A second-tier request is for flashing red traffic signals at Pratt and Lombard and Chester. There was discussion about removing the traffic signals and replacing them to stop signs to reduce the instances of "racing to catch the light," but DOT suggested this as an alternative that would be quicker to implement, would have the same result, and could be easily changed back if deemed necessary.

The request also includes recommendations for the dangerous Collington and Baltimore St. intersection.

The final draft of the plan document is being finalized and will be posted on butchershill.org when it is ready.

Paperless Water Billing \\ Residents may sign up for the city's newly launched paperless water billing and new payment plan option, called PromisePay. Once enrolled, residents will have the ability to pay off past-due residential water bill balances over time without accruing interest.

To go paperless, log into <u>waterbillportal.baltimorecity.</u> <u>gov/#Register</u>. Your activation code can be found on the back of the monthly water bill. Select the paperless billing on the account summary page. Verify your email address and click the OK button.

Any residential water account in Baltimore with a past due balance of \$250 to \$5,000 is eligible to enroll in the interest free PromisePay payment plan.

Drop-Off Centers and Landfills \\ New times: 2840 Sisson Street and 6101 Bowley's residential drop-off centers will remain open until 5pm. Quarantine Road landfill and residential drop-off center's new winter hours are 7:30am—3:30pm, Mon.—Sat. These hours will be in effect until March 12, 2023.

Safety Tip \ A reminder from BCPD: Be sure that doors and windows on all levels of your house are securely locked. Look around your row of houses. Could someone easily get onto your roof via stairs or another point of access? Be aware.

National Parks Free Entrance \\ Entrance fees will be waived on the following dates: Apr. 22 (National Park Week), Aug. 4, Sep. 23 (National Public Lands Day), and Nov. 11. Other fees (camping, parking, etc.) may have a fee. The annual pass to visit any national park is \$80. If you are 62 or older, a life-time pass is available for that price. Special passes are available for military service members and their dependents, anyone with permanent disabilities, those who volunteer in a park, and any fourth grader. In Baltimore, Fort McHenry is a historic national monument and historic shrine. In Towson, the Hampton Mansion is a national historic site. For more information, visit nps.gov/findapark.
