The next leaders will continue to succeed both at that balance and at keeping Butchers Hill the awesome neighborhood that it is as long as there is a pool of people that believe in the neighborhood who are willing to put forth the effort to keep it great.

Streetscape Committee

Thank you December dumpster crew \\ The December dumpster was a great success, in spite of the rain. Thanks to Ann, David, Lindsay, and Sandy, the dumpster was packed full when it was picked up. Thanks to DPW for our driver delivering it at a reasonable time and informing us that in the future NO METAL can go into the landfill. It must be recycled. And thanks to Adam and the fact that he has for years volunteered to use his truck to collect metal and recycle it, we have been ahead of the curve.

Curbside Christmas tree pickup/mulching \\ Jan. 5-29, place the tree (with no trimmings) out with your regular trash. You may also take trees to Sisson Street Citizen Drop-Off Center to be mulched. If you bring your own bag, you can take rough cut tree mulch for your garden or tree pit.

Absolutely no plastic bags or styrofoam in recycling\\ It clogs up the conveyor belts at the recycling center. Then all sorting has to stop while the bits are manually removed. Also, recycling that is contaminated with food and grease can't be recycled. All bottles, cans, and paper must be clean.

Winter Gardening Tips \\

- After the first frost it is time to plant spring-flowering bulbs. This prevents them from sprouting prematurely. Always choose a sunny, well-drained location.
- Outdoor plants in winter still need maintenance. Water only when we have had less than three inches of precipitation for more than a month. Shovel snow (that does not contain snow melt chemicals or salt) off walkways into tree pits, plants in containers, and gardens as both insulation and slow watering. Save pruning of trees and shrubs until Feb.
- Weekly gutter and sidewalk trash patrol will keep our neighborhood clean and safe.

A good habit is born \\ While putting out your weekly trash, wear a glove to pick up the bits of debris that have blown onto your sidewalk and gutter and toss them in with your trash. Smile, job well done, and we all thank you!

Reminder to pet owners \\ There is only one place for dog poop, and that is your own garbage can!!

Safety Committee

The Butcher's Hill Safety Committee wishes everyone a safe and bounteous new year. We will restart our community safety walks Wed., Jan.18, at 6pm. We'll start at Halcott Square, 118 S. Duncan, and proceed south to Pratt then west to Washington and return on East Lombard. These walks are a great chance to get out, meet your neighbors, and to look at the neighborhood from a safety perspective. We are usually accompanied by a BCPD officer or two and most walks result in 311 calls on abandoned property, safety hazards, and broken infrastructure. All are welcome to join us, dress warmly.

Safety tip \\ The committee reminds everyone to password or otherwise lock their Venmo, Cash App, and any other cash-sending apps on their smartphone. January Notes & Activities

Snow Emergency Phases \\ Phase One: All moving vehicles must have snow or all-weather-radial tires or chains. Phase Two: Parking is prohibited on designated snow emergency routes, including Pratt, Lombard, and Baltimore Streets and Patterson Park Avenue. Phase Three: Only emergency vehicles may drive on city streets. All radio and TV news will announce this.

If a Phase Two seems imminent, it is advisable to look for parking on non-emergency streets as soon as possible. If Phase Two is announced and you can't find a space, call 311 to find out where the city has designated parking for our area. Vehicles parked on snow emergency streets will be ticketed and towed so snowplows can do their work.

Code Blue \\ The city health commissioner declares Code Blue days when the temperature (with wind chill) falls below 14 degrees. Temperatures below 10 degrees require pets to be brought into a heated space.

During Code Blue, city agencies work to distribute meals to at-risk senior citizens, provide home weatherization services (*dhcd.baltimorecity.gov*, (410) 396-3023), provide additional cold weather education and outreach efforts (*health. baltimorecity.gov*), and help individuals apply for energy assistance (410) 396-0900.

For more information, service request, or to find a nearby shelter, call 311 or 211. Our nearest Community Action Partnership (CAP) Center is at 3411 Bank St., (410) 545-6518.

Protect your pipes \\ Know where the water shut off valve is for every sink, toilet, tub, or shower. If you can't find those, know where the main shutoff valve for the whole building is located. When daytime temperatures remain below 25 degrees for more than a day or two, water pipes located close to an unheated exterior wall can freeze and break, leaking water continuously. These are usually under sinks or touching an exterior wall. Make sure heat reaches these areas. In an unheated area (basement, crawl space), it is possible to insulate the pipes or wrap them with electric powered heat tape. The easiest solution is to keep both the hot- and cold-water faucets on with a pencil-thin stream of water, especially overnight. Water bills are cheaper than damaged walls.

If a pipe seems frozen because the water doesn't run, carefully use a blow dryer to gently warm the pipes. Warming too quickly can break the pipe at a joint. Be alert to sounds of running water in unheated vacant properties. Adjacent properties can become flooded. Call 311 to report or 911 if water is impacting your property.

NO FOG down your drains \\ Fats, oils, and grease cause sewer backups when put down drains or toilets. The congealed fats catch debris and clog pipes. Discard used oils from cooking by pouring into a used can or jar or using paper towels and then discard into the garbage.

Beat the winter blahs \\ BBaltimore's museums are family friendly and welcoming. Frequently the museums do not charge for admission, but may require timed entry and/or charge for certain exhibits.
