**CHAP Blocks in Butchers Hill** \\ The Land Use Committee reminds property owners in the 2100 and 2200 blocks of East Baltimore Street and the 2200 block East Pratt Street, that you live in a City Historic District. All planned exterior work, including painting, must be submitted to CHAP (the Commission on Historical and Architectural Preservation).

**Christmas Trees** \\ Cleared of all decorations, may be put out with regular trash pickup during the month of January.

Melting Ice Safely \\ To prevent damage to your home and the environment, choose a deicer carefully. Sidewalks on the north side of buildings are in permanent shade and need deicing. Magnesium chloride works quickly down to -13 degrees, does not damage concrete or metal, but should not be used on tree wells or plants. Others: calcium, sodium, or potassium chloride damage everything. Sand, ashes, or kitty litter improve traction on icy areas like steps. When shoveling snow or ice, remove it all the way to the concrete to allow the sun's rays to warm the concrete and melt snow and ice. ### Safety Committee

Community Safety Works Grant \\ In 2023, Butchers Hill was awarded a \$50K Community Safety Works Grant from the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development. We were able to use this money to acquire several video systems that are being deployed on key intersections in our community where traffic incidents have historically occurred or that have experienced recent traffic/ pedestrian issues. We have also invested in the build out of a traffic calming bump-out on S. Chester St. This month, MDHCD is again soliciting proposals for grants, and the Safety Committee is asking the community for ideas to put in the next grant proposal. We believe that the current state administration may favor requests that also have an environmental or energy reduction angle to them. If you have ideas, please come to the Safety Committee meeting on Weds, Jan 10, (on Zoom) and help us sculpt the next round of safety investments for our community; if you can't make the meeting, send us an email.

**Street Safety Ideas** \\ In December, the Safety Committee met to discuss ideas for pedestrian (and driver) street safety tradecraft, and we heard many great ideas. We suspect that there are many more great ideas out there that people have found effective. If you have good advice, tricks, and tips, email them to the Safety Committee as we are compiling them into a Neighborhood Safety Guide that we will post in February.

Safety Walk \\ The January Community Safety Walk will occur on Wed., Jan. 17, at 7pm. We will meet at Halcott Square and explore safety issues up Duncan to Fairmount and then back via Madeira. These walks typically explore matters such as poor street lighting, abandoned property, and pedestrian/ driving hazards. We will be particularly focused on identifying grant ideas on this walk. All are welcome to attend this event. Dress warmly, come out, meet your neighbors, walk your pets, exchange safety tradecraft, and experience the wonderful diversity of our beautiful community.

In Case of Snow \\ All residents and businesses are responsible for keeping a two-foot-wide footpath adjacent to their property, safe for pedestrians, and free of snow and ice, within three hours or by 11am. Tips: sweep or shovel early while it is easier and clear from building to curb. The fine for not shoveling is \$50.

Snow emergency routes include Pratt, Lombard, Baltimore, and Washington Streets and Patterson Park Ave. No parking on these routes when Phase 2 snow emergency is in effect. Check local news stations for updates.

#### Miscellaneous News

Baltimore Green Space \\ BGS, the nonprofit that BHA supports and that holds the land trust on Halcott Square, our local pocket park in the 100 block of South Duncan St., had a busy year. In 2023 they, with the help of 1,307 volunteers, conducted 66 workshops, reached 102 sites, removed 454 bags of trash and invasive plants, and planted 2,577 new plants. **911 Innovation Award** \\ Baltimore's 911 pilot program – intended to change the behavioral health landscape – was recently awarded. The program assumes that we do not need to and should not be providing a police response to calls that are better, and more appropriately, handled by trained professionals. Instead calls were resolved through a partnership with Behavioral Health System Baltimore (BHSB) and Baltimore Crisis Response, Inc. (BCRI). Since the work began, over six hundred 911 calls have been successfully resolved through the 988 helping and 187 mobile crisis team responses.

**Child Safety News regarding Water Beads** \\ The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) issued a consumer alert for the Chuckle & Roar Ultimate Water Beads Activity Kit, stating that the beads can cause injuries, lifelong health consequences and even death to children if swallowed. The water bead activity kit was recalled in Sept. after reports indicated at least two children under 12 months old swallowed the beds. The product was sold exclusively at Target. Water beads can easily scatter, roll and become lost in the home and be ingested in the dehydrated state. If you suspect a child has swallowed a water bead for inserted it into their ear or nose, seek medical treatment right away.
