Safety Committee

The Safety Committee is working with the Streetscape Committee to advance ideas for 2024 DHCD grants that could impact our community in positive ways. We anticipate that the 2024 grants will bring more focus on environmental and public health considerations. If this interests you or you have innovative ideas, please join us in shaping the grant proposal. The Safety Committee is continuing to implement projects resulting from 2023 grant awards and is arranging several video projects focused on dangerous intersections and traffic calming measures. The Safety Committee is also working with the newly established Johns Hopkins University police force to address pedestrian safety impacts of the Commodore John Rodgers School reconstruction project and pathways from Butchers Hill to and from the Hopkins medical campus. We are excited to adapt our successful safety walks to a more comprehensive and socially-focused format (see article on next page).

Streetscape Committee

Review of Recyclable Materials \\ Plastics: bottles, jugs, and jars (unless they contained motor oil or poisons) and prescription bottles (including caps). Rule of thumb: If the top of the container is narrower than the bottom, it is recyclable.

- Paper and cardboard: All (including hardback books) unless it is metallic or soiled with grease.
- Metal: All clean cans and aluminum foil pans and empty aerosol cans.
- Glass: All clean bottles and jars (all colors, lids may be left on).

Spring Planting Plans \\ Ready to think about spring gardening? The National Wildlife Federation recommends food, water, and shelter needs for birds, bees, and butterflies at nwf.org. Find inspiration for small spaces at <u>nwf.org/keystoneplants</u> for our ecoregion. You can make a vertical garden in a small space (balcony or patio) with containers and trellises. Native plant combination kits can be found at <u>gardenforwildlife.com</u>.
