CHAP Blocks in Butchers Hill \\ The Land Use Committee reminds property owners in the 2100 and 2200 blocks of East Baltimore Street and the 2200 block East Pratt Street, that you live in a City Historic District. All planned exterior work, including painting, must be submitted to CHAP (the Commission on Historical and Architectural Preservation).

Safety Committee

Safety for shorter days \\ With that refreshing nip in the air, we can anticipate shorter days ahead. This is a great time to think about shorter-day safety strategies. For pedestrians and cyclists in the neighborhood, reflect on your lighting strategy. Consider carrying a small flashlight and wearing more reflective clothing and using reflective dog leashes. Bikes require lights if operated after dark. Residents, consider using stoop lights, they now make very affordable switches that track dawn and dusk for you based on your latitude so that you can configure the switch once and forget it. Get those smoke and CO detectors tested (or acquired if you don't have one!). Change your furnace and dryer filters and consider having your furnace checked by a qualified expert, particularly if your furnace is older. A few simple steps will go a long way toward safer, shorter days.

Honda owners alert \\ There has been a rash of airbag thefts recently in all Honda models. Thieves working together as a team can smash a car window and grab an airbag in about 15 seconds. Consider getting a steering wheel lock that also protects your airbag. Several are available in stores and on Amazon.

Safety walk \\ Our next Safety Walk will be on Wed., Oct. 18 at 7pm. We'll meet at Castle Street Park (2021 E Fairmount Ave) and walk east and north looking for street lighting issues, abandoned property, trip hazards, missing and damaged signs, and launching 311 requests. Please join us for a pleasant stroll in the crisp night air. We are often accompanied by our BCPD community outreach officers who can impart a wealth of great safety knowledge. Escorts home provided if needed.

And About Those Rats... by Burke Cochrane

Our neighborhood has seen a rise in the number of dog owners enjoying our beautiful parks and streets. While this is a wonderful sign of an active and engaged community, it's crucial that we address a growing concern: the proper disposal of dog waste. Not only is it a matter of cleanliness and courtesy, it's also directly tied to preventing health hazards and avoiding rat infestations.

The Rat Connection. One of the lesser known but crucial reasons to pick up dog waste is its direct link to rat infestations. In cities like Baltimore, the presence of rat populations can be a persistent challenge. Rats are attracted to the smell and nutrients in dog waste, which can provide a steady food source and contribute to their rapid breeding and infestation rates.

As responsible members of this community, it's our duty to maintain its cleanliness and safety. Picking up after our dogs mitigates health risks, prevents rat infestations, and contributes to the overall well-being of our neighborhood.
